The happiest country in the world in 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021.




Students' study paths differentiate relatively late in Finland.



Trust in policymakers and other people in Finland is high






Finnish higher education system is

 - applied research and development








Education, employment and quality of life


Unemployment by level of education 1987-2019 (%) age groups 18-64

People (%) who perceive their average quality of life as good (WHOQOL-8), entire country


